- Won NASCAR Cup Series race on Oct. 28 at Texas Motor Speedway in Fort Worth to score 57th career Cup Series win.
- Won Gander Outdoors & RV Truck Series race on July 18 at Texas Motor Speedway to score his 59th career series victory.
- Won Truck Series race on June 13 at Homestead-Miami Speedway to score his 58th career series victory
- Won NASCAR Xfinity Series race at Charlotte (N.C.) Motor Speedway on May 25 to score his 97th career series victory.
- Won Truck Series race on February 21 at Las Vegas Motor Speedway to score his 57th career series victory.

2019

- Won Truck Series races on February 23 at Atlanta Motor Speedway and March 1 at Las Vegas Motor Speedway, his 52nd and 53rd career series victories. The Atlanta win gave Busch the all-time Truck Series wins record.

- Won back-to-back NASCAR Cup Series races at ISM Raceway near Phoenix on March 10 and Auto Club Speedway in Fontana, California on March 17 to score his 52nd and 53rd Cup Series wins. The March 17 Cup Series win at Fontana marked Busch's 200th career NASCAR National Series victory.
- Won Cup Series race at Bristol (Tenn.) Motor Speedway on April 7 to score his 54th win in NASCAR's top series, tying him with Lee Petty on the all-time win list.
- Won Cup Series race at Pocono (Pa.) Raceway on June 2 to score his 55th win in NASCAR's top series, tying him with NASCAR Hall of Famer Rusty Wallace on the all-time win list.
- Won Xfinity Series race at Indianapolis Motor Speedway on September 7 to score his 94th career series victory.
- Won NASCAR Cup Series race on Nov. 17 at Homestead to score 56th career Cup Series win.
- Captured 2019 NASCAR Cup Series Championship on Nov. 17 at Homestead, the second of his career.

- Won NASCAR Cup Series Can-Am 500k at ISM Raceway near Phoenix on November 11 to score his 51st career win. The
 win vaulted Busch past NASCAR Hall of Famers Ned Jarrett and Junior Johnson as Busch now sits along in 11th on the alltime win list in NASCAR's top series.
- Won NASCAR Cup Series pole at Martinsville (Va.) Speedway, the 31st of his Cup Series career on October 28.
- Won Cup Series Federated Auto Parts 400 at Richmond (Va.) Raceway on September 22 to score his 50th career win.
- Won Cup Series Overton's 400 at Chicagoland Speedway in Joliet, Illinois on July 1 to score his 48th career series victory and Gander Outdoors 400 at Pocono (Pa.) Raceway on July 29 to score his 49th career win.
